Jan. 5 Helping Hands & How-to SIGs

Chuck Frederick reported that the subjects discussed and/or demonstrated were as follows: how to use Acronis backup program to clone a hard drive; how to use the program “decrapafyer” to remove bloat ware; how to use a new tablet (hardware) with Android OS; how to set up a tablet to use wifi, how to set up Firefox 64 bit version; how to swap parts from 2 computers to create a new working unit; how to stop the A drive from showing up in the task bar and how to read “Q” codes and “bar codes” with a smart phone.

Topics included: How do you capture an image on your screen, for example error messages? Options include keyboard key “Prt Scr”, or use of Win7 “Snipping Tool” and/or freeware programs “Snag It” and “Screen Capture.” Do you know what a firewall and router are and do you need them?



Those attending were worried over recent tv and news warnings on **Java security threats**. This issue does not seem to be resolved yet. So this writer “Googled” “java security threat” and got TMI (too much information) but did learn a thing or two. Recommend you do the same to find if you have Java, or why you might need it, and the latest news. In the meanwhile I disabled Java until the all clear signal is released. Our club VP offered this solution from Gizmo’s Freeware, posted 16 Jan 2013, “There are dangerous exploits going around that take advantage of yet more security problems in Java. Java is installed on many PCs and is a common add-on for browsers. A quick and easy way to update Java and clean up old versions of Java, or remove it entirely, is to use the free app called **JavaRa**. Here’s how to use it:”

How does a surge protector differ from an UPS (uninterruptible power supply)?

A UPS features “a built-in battery that allows connected devices to continue running, giving you time to properly shut them off; a surge protector only blocks excess power, say, the result of a power spike, from reaching the devices. The time your equipment will be able to run on a UPS can vary from just a few minutes to one to two hours, depending on the UPS’s battery and on the amount of power required by the devices connected to the UPS. Some UPSes even include software that you can install on your PC so that you can manage power and receive text alerts or other notifications when there’s trouble.”

“A UPS also protects against surges in voltage and delivers interference-free power to your computer and other components. Both devices are capable of blocking power surges that can irreparably damage electrical equipment, such as excess voltage from the fluctuations of energy that occur when high-power devices on or off. (Power surges can also occur because of bad wiring, lightning strikes, or even during maintenance performed by your local utility.)” [Editor’s note: Whether you need either one can be discussed at one of our SIGs. Just ask.]
