DVDs Question

Q. Some of my DVD movies keep pausing and skipping. How can I stop that?

A. It is possible that the discs are dirty. Check the data side of the discs for fingerprints, dirt, scratches, moisture, cracks or other damage. Most dirt can be easily removed by wiping the disc with a clean, dry towel. Wipe in a circular pattern, starting from the center and gently moving outward. If the problem persists, the inside of your drive may be dirty. Open the tray and use a can of compressed air with a long thin nozzle to blow out any debris. 🐿


Tech Questions

Spam Email: Why am I receiving spam emails from someone in my Contacts List? It is possible that someone has figured out your friend's email sign-on and password. (If your contacts are getting spam emails purported to be from you, then your sign-on and password have probably been compromised.) This is not necessarily the result of a malware infestation, although it could have started that way with malware harvesting the sign-on and password.

The solution: Log on and immediately change username(s) and password(s), as well as the answers to any security questions. If log on not possible, dump the email account and start fresh.

Computer Rebooting Involuntarily:



My computer reboots for no apparent reason, sometimes while working on it and sometimes when system is just sitting idle. The solution: It is always worthwhile to make sure that the problem isn't being caused by malware. Start with a couple of good scans from trusted anti-malware apps, such as Malwarebytes (free for personal use: www.malwarebytes.org).

If you are reasonably sure the system is clean and still have problems, you may have two other causes: 1. Conflicting applications bumping into one another or 2. Damaged hardware. If the reboots happen when you are not running any foreground apps, then start looking at your Startup and utility apps that run in the background. Shut down as many as possible, then start adding them back, one at a time, to see if you can isolate the one causing the problem. Damaged hardware can include bad stick of

memory (easy enough to swap and replace), graphics card (easy but can be expensive), or motherboard (just hope that's not it). Borrowing some memory and graphic card replacements to test may be easy but replacing the motherboard is more difficult, but possible.
